KEYNOTES

Monday, November 16, 2015 - Sheldon Kennedy - 9:30am - 10:30am

Sheldon Kennedy has skated for three teams in his eight year NHL career but is best known for his courageous decision to charge his Major Junior Hockey League Coach with sexual assault for the abuse he suffered over a five year period while a teenager under his care.



Sheldon has become an inspiration to millions of abuse survivors around the world and a committed, outspoken child advocate. His life story was amade into an award winning movie, he has appeared on Oprah, ABC's Nightline, W-5 and the Fifth Estate.

He has received several awards for his tireless work including the Scotiabank Humanitarian Award, an Honorary Doctorate of Law Degree from the University of the Fraser Valley, 2012 Calgary Citizen of the EYar, the 2014 David Foster Foundation Humanitarian Award and in 2015, Sheldon was named Member of the Order of Canada.

He has influenced change in Canadian Law and has taken his message to the International Olympic Committee and the US Senate.

Sheldon serves on the Board of the Sheldon Kennedy Child Advocacy Centre, the first of its kind in Canada, offering full wrap-around services for victims of child abuse. Sheldon continues to influence social change through Respect Group, the company he co-founded that provides empowering on-line education for the prevention of abuse, bullying, and harassment in youth serving organizations, schools and the workplace.



Monday, November 16, 2015 – The Iacobucci Report - 1:30pm – 2:30pm Sgt. Chris Boddy & Dr. John Bradford



Chris Boddy is a Staff Sergeant, police officer at Toronto Police Service. As a devoted member of the Toronto Police, Chris is committed to improving public safety on the Toronto streets. He is an active tweeter, keeping the community informed and updated on what's happening in Toronto, and offering tips to keep you and your family safe.

Dr. John Bradford is the former Associate Chief (Forensic) of the Royal Ottawa Health Care Group, Ottawa, ON. He is the former Chair of the Division of Forensic Psychiatry, Faculty of Medicine and is a full Professor in the Dept. of Psychiatry at the University of Ottawa.

Dr. Bradford is a graduate in medicine and received a diploma of psychological medicinen from the University of Capetown, South Africa. He holds specialist certification in psychiatry from South Africa, the UK, USA and Canada, and also has a sub-speciality certification in forensic pyschiatry from the USA.

Dr. Bradford's expertise in the field of forensic psychiatry is well recognized not only from his peers, media and judicary but from many levels of government as well. He has sat on

task forces, expert panels, served as expert witness and provided special consultation to national and international working groups.



His work has been recognized by the Canadian Academy of Psychiatry and the Law and he was the first recipient of the Bruno Cormier award for service to forensic psychiatry in Canada in 1994. Dr. Bradford has also been recognized by the American Academy of Psychitary and the Law, receiving the Seymour Pollock award in 2007. He was the recipient of the Isaac Ray Award at the 2009 annual meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. He was awarded the Order of Canada on November 4, 2011.

Dr. Karen De Freitas is a forensic psychiatrist and Medical Director of the Forensic Program at Ontario Shores Centre for Mental Health Sciences (Ontario Shores). Dr. De Freitas is also a member of the Ontario Review Board and a lecturer in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Toronto.

Peter DeFreitas is counsel for the Department of Justice, Ontario Regional Office. He is a graduate of the University of Western Ontario Law School. He joined the Department of Justice in 1994 as counsel in the Prosecution Section. From 1994 to the present, he has prosecuted offences under the Narcotics Control Act, the Income Tax Act, and the Criminal Code, and he has argued appeals in the Ontario Court of Appeal. He has published a number of articles on criminal law topics and lectured at prosecutors' seminars and training seminars for investigative agencies.





Cst. Scott Logan joined the Durham Regional Police Service in 2006 as a frontline Officer in the City of Oshawa. In 2009 until present, Scott has been a member of the Mobile Crisis Intervention Team, where he co-facilitates the training of Officer in responding to mental health related calls. Scott is also a member of the DRPS Public Safety Unit, a unit responsible for responding to large public disturbances and searching for missing people. Prior to Policing, Scott worked as a Pathology Assistant, where he assisted with autopsy procedures and as well as in the healthcare security field



Yolanda Diston, R.N. is A Registered Nurse with more than 25 years of experience providing a strong and varied skill set in Mental Health care. Yolanda holds Certification of Competence as a Registered Nurse through the Ontario College of Nurses, the New York State Education Department, the Nursing Board of Western Australia and the Washington State Department of Health. In addition Yolanda holds Certification of Forensic Mental Health from the University of Toronto. She is currently employed by Durham Mental Health Services working in partnership with Durham Region Police as a Registered Nurse with the MCIT (mobile crisis intervention team).

Dr. Philip Klassen brings more than 15 years of psychiatric experience to his role as Vice-President of Medical Affairs at Ontario Shores Centre for Mental Health Sciences (Ontario Shores). Dr. Klassen works closely with the medical and clinical leadership teams to support the organization's objectives within an evolving healthcare system to ensure a sustainable and comprehensive network of services. He is also an Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and the Department of Medicine at the University of Toronto. An active researcher and well-published forensic psychiatrist, Dr. Klassen's particular areas of interest include violence risk assessment, clinical sexology, assessment of post-traumatic symptomatology and assessment of professional misconduct.



Tuesday, November 17th, 2015 - Robb Nash - 3:00pm - 4:30pm



Robb Nash is becoming nationally known for leaving a successful music career to share his incredible story with students across Canada, inspiring them to live lives of purpose.

Robb was the victim of a serious auto accident, a head on collision with a semi truck. He was found with a fractured skull and pronounced dead by first responders. But by the time the ambulance had arrived at the scene to take his body to the hospital, Robb's pulse had miraculously returned. After a difficult recovery, and despite significant physical and emotional scars, Robb was left with a new outlook on life.

He started a band as a way to leverage the power of music to share his philosophy, and soon had songs in the Canadian Top 10. Robb saw musical success as a platform from which to influence and motivate young people. He put aside performing to large audiences, and began speaking to youth in their schools across the country, playing his songs and sharing their meaning with his young audiences.

Robb and his band bring their presentation to more than 200 schools through 150 shows each year. He speaks to over 60,000 students directly, and touches another 500,000 through other medium like Facebook and YouTube. He walks head on into difficult topics, knowing that these are the things on young people's minds...bullying, addiction, self harm..and suicide.

Robb exudes positive energy in story and song, and sensitively deals with the serious issues that he's experienced first hand. His relatable and approachable style creates credibility and trust with the students he meets. Their inevitable undivided attention allows Robb to plant a message of hope and inspiration in their minds and hearts. He challenges them to make changes in themselves and the world around them.



Wednesday, November 18th, 2015 – Madam Justice Heather Perkins-McVey 11:15am – 12:15pm



Madam Justice Heather Perkins-McVey was appointed to the Ontario Court of Justice in June 2009 and presides over Criminal matters in Ottawa and the East Region of Ontario. Justice Perkins-McVey is the Judicial representative of the Mental Health Court Committee. Prior to her appointment to the Bench, Ms. Perkins-McVey was actively involved with others in 2007 in setting up the Adult Mental Health Court and in May 2008 in setting the Youth Mental Health Court up in Ottawa. In addition, Ms. Perkins-McVey has been a trustee of the County of Carleton Law Association, former Chair of the Criminal Section of the Canadian Bar Association and a Member of Boards of Directors of various community agencies working to assist persons with mental health and cognitive disabilities.
